

Language and Culture

What's happened

- ☐ We have had 4 sessions of language and culture so far.
- Our first session we looked at the different languages we speak as a group, what languages we hope to learn in the future, where languages can take you and ourselves as a "language learner".
- ☐ We then did a **Russian lesson** led by COB. We learnt the alphabet in Russian and how difficult it is to write our names when the alphabet is different! We completed a project on Russia where we researched an aspect of Russian culture.
- ☐ Yesterday, we had an **Italian lesson** led by Abigail in Year 11.

The origin of the Russian alphabet

The Russian alphabet is made up of the Cyrillic alphabet, as is the Mongolian, Bulgarian, Belarusian, Ukrainian, Serbian, Macedonian and Old Church Slavonic, with some adjustments, as shown in the Venn diagram. It was created by a Byzantine monk called Saint Cyril in 683 AD, in an attempt to Christianize the tribes of Eastern Europe, by translating the Bible into Slavic languages. He created the alphabet using alphabets of other languages, and combining them to show the sounds of the Slavic dialect

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Blini (Russian pancakes)

Many Russian foods come from religious traditions. For examples, Blini (Russian Pancakes) have been preserved from the days of Paganism. They would make the pancakes round, just like the sun. You are encouraged to add your own filings, however the traditional filings are sour cream and salmon, caviar or mushrooms. You can even add condensed milk and berries if you have a sweet tooth. There is even a special holiday, Maslenitsa, which happens every year one week before the start of spring, when for the whole week Russians eat pancakes.

Maslenitsa Festival and international women's day



Seven weeks before Easter are the week-long Maslenitsa festivities – Russia's Pancake Week. They combine the tradition of marking the transition from Winter and Spring with the Christian tradition of feasting before lent. Each day there were different activities include: making Maslenitsa dolls from straw and old clothes as well as making and eating pancakes (blinis), sledging, fist-fights, exchanging gifts, feasting and drinking tea or vodka. However, after making the Maslenitsa dolls, the Russian's burn them and people jump over the bonfires.

On the 8th of March, International Women's Day is celebrated. This festival symbolizes Women's equality; most people in Russia refer to International Women's Day just as "the eighth of March". It's a day for celebrating women's achievements: people have time off work, workplaces organize celebrations, and everyone gives gifts to the important women in their lives.


Maslenitsa Festival

Dance and the arts


What's happened/progress: Sessions are due to commence 21/11/22.

We will be looking at different styles of art and dance from around the world and in the media. We will be looking at how we can share culture through different physical arts and using this to increase our knowledge of around the world.

In November we will begin looking at theatre before attending the pantomime and/or watching dance within film. We will then create our own pieces to share with the group.







Outdoor Adventurous Activities (OAA)

What is OAA?

An opportunity to get outside and work on physical and social skills. A chance to work in a team or individually to solve problems and compete against yourself and others. Our focus for this half term will be **orienteering.**

Key skills:

Understanding how to read maps

Improve decision making and problem solving

Develop knowledge in a range of subjects, such as PE, geography and maths.



OAA trip – Summer term or September 2023

Sports Leaders

Rationale/Aims: To improve pupils ability to communicate, organise and work in a team in order to plan and deliver sports sessions.

What's happened/progress: 12 pupils have completed a sports leaders programme which looked at: warm-ups (what are they/ how can we adapt them to different ages or abilities); grouping pupils (how can we do this fairly considering everyone); competition structures and inclusivity (how to structure a tournament and how to adapt this to suit the event) and planning an event. This led onto them leading primary school aged pupils in a cricket event and a sports hall athletics event.

Impact: Pupils have become role models in school and within local primary schools and this will support the transition into TCA for those pupils. Previously some of our transition schools have had low attendance in sports events, so this will be an additional benefit. The pupils themselves also now volunteer for younger age groups within the opportunities programme to further develop their skills and put them into practice.

Next Actions: Continue to plan primary school events within the local area and complete a round 2 of the programme to increase the number of sports leaders for both PE lessons and after school events.

Extending Students / Student Achievements (Leadership)

FXTFNSION

Pupils have learnt leadership skills focussing on communication, organisation, motivation and teamwork.

Pupils have been able to plan and deliver sessions that are appropriate to a range of age groups.

ACHIEVEMENT

Pupils have been able to work as a team to lead a variety of sessions to the local primary schools including cricket and sports hall athletics.

Pupils have been able to support their peers and/or younger year groups within our opportunities programme by leading small aspects such as warm-ups and drills. This has allowed them to gain confidence and inspire others.
